II. For Reformation whereof, be it Enacted by our Sovereign Lord the

Mar. fest. 3. of, and from the City of London, c. 11. which Waters have their Course and 13 Eliz. 0.94 Fall into the River of Thames, shall, from henceforth, be to all Intents, Constructions and Purposes, as fully subject to the Commission of Sewers, and to all the Statutes made for Sewers, and to all Penalties in the same Statutes, and in every of them contained, as if the same Places near to the faid City of London had been particularly named in the faid Statute of Sewers, or that therein the Water had ebbed and flowed, and therein free Passage with Boats and Barges to the Sea had been heretofore used; any Thing in the said Statutes or elsewhere to the contrary in any wife notwithstanding.
