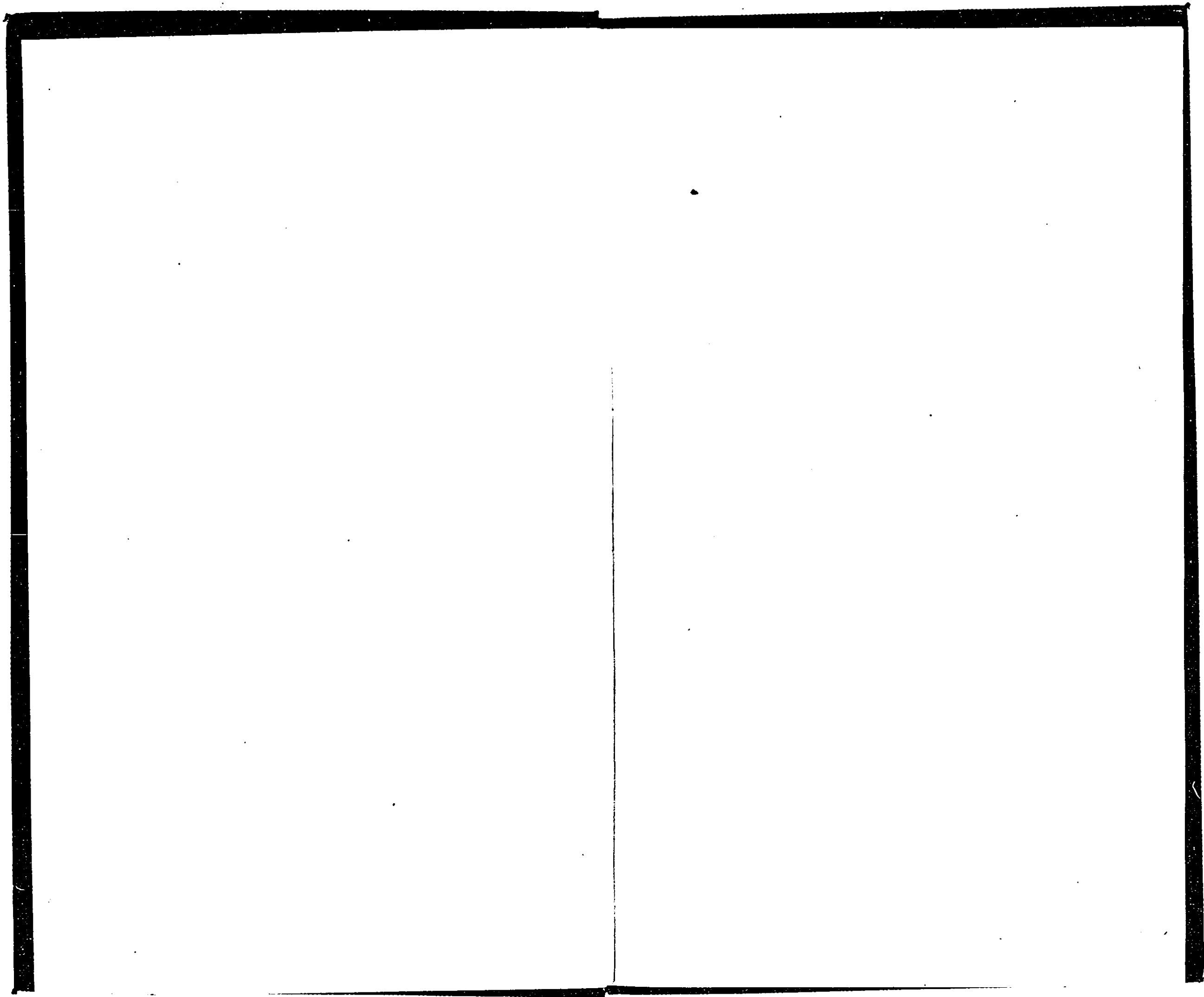

RULES

FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE CHARITY.

1. THAT this Charity shall be called the *Royal Free Hospital*, and consist of a patron, patronesses, president, vice-presidents, governors, treasurer, secretary, physician, three surgeons, resident dispenser, and collector.

2. That every person subscribing one guinea or more annually shall be a governor, and, at the election of each officer, be entitled to one vote for every guinea he may so subscribe.

3. That every person making a donation of ten pounds in one sum; and every governor who, having subscribed one guinea or more annually, shall, at any time, within five years from the date of such first subscription, make a donation or donations, which, together with his subscriptions already paid, shall amount to ten pounds; and every person who shall make donations within three years, amounting in the whole to ten pounds; shall be a life-governor, and entitled to one vote; and every person who, after having become a life-governor, shall again subscribe one guinea annually, and make donations as herein-before stated, shall be entitled to an additional vote at the election of each officer of the institution, for every additional sum of ten pounds so given; or for each sum of ten pounds originally given to this charity; but that no contributor shall have more than ten votes, whatever may be the amount of his contribution.

4. That no governor shall be entitled to vote at any election, unless his first subscription shall have been paid three months previously; but a life-governor may vote immediately after having become so.

5. That, upon payment of a legacy of fifty guineas or upwards, the executor, or person appointed to pay the same, shall be a governor for life; and that every minister who shall have preached a sermon on behalf of this charity, at the request of the governors assembled in general meeting, or of the committee for the time being, shall be an honorary life-governor and entitled to one vote.

6. That the management of the charity and of the hospital shall be under the direction of a committee of twenty-four governors, who shall be elected by the governors at large at their annual general meeting, and authorized to fill up their number from the governors, in case of a vacancy among them: they shall remain in office one year, and until their successors shall be appointed. All honorary and medical officers shall be members of the committee *ex officio*, but without having a vote upon the proceedings: which restriction shall not, however, apply to those in office at the passing of these rules. The committee shall be empowered to make rules and regulations for their own government, and for the government of the hospital, and to annul and alter the same from time to time; but such rules and regulations shall in no wise be contrary to the rules made by the governors at their general meetings. No alterations in these rules, or additions thereto, shall be made but at a general meeting of the governors, due notice of which alteration or addition having been given at a previous general meeting.

7. That the committee shall meet on the first Thursday in every month, when three members, exclusive of the honorary and medical officers, shall form a quorum.

8. That all general meetings of the governors shall be called by advertisement in two or more of the public papers, and that the chair shall be taken within a quarter of an hour of the specified time.

9. That the annual general meeting of the governors shall be held on the last Tuesday in February, when a report of the committee for the past year, together with an account, debit and credit, made up to the 31st of January inclusive, shall be submitted. This account the auditors shall examine before the annual meeting, and, if correct, sign the same; the auditors shall be empowered to report thereupon, if it be found expedient so to do. A report shall be furnished by the treasurer, together with his account for the past year, made up to the 31st of January inclusive; which account the auditors shall examine, previous to the annual meeting, and, if correct, sign the same. A report shall be furnished by the trustees, signed by them, of the stock standing in their names, as belonging to the charity. These several reports and accounts having been submitted, such of them as may be approved by the meeting shall be signed by the chairman, and ordered to be entered upon the minutes.

The treasurer, honorary secretary, medical officers, committee, auditors, and collector, are to be elected for the year ensuing, and until such time as their successors shall be appointed; in the event of a contest, the meeting shall adjourn, but no new candidate shall be eligible unless he shall have given fourteen days' previous notice to the secretary, who shall then proceed as in the case of a vacancy.—See Rule 10.

The quarterly general meetings shall be held on the second Tuesdays in the months of January, April, July, and October, when quarterly reports shall be made by the committee, and their proceedings laid on the table for the inspection of the governors.

10. That, in the event of a vacancy in the situations of physician, surgeon, secretary, or collector, a special meeting of the governors shall be called to declare the same, and to consider what steps shall be forthwith taken, and to name the day of election. If contested, the vacancy shall be filled up by election by ballot, at a general or special meeting of the governors, summoned for that purpose only, by advertisement in two or more of the public newspapers, at least fourteen days previous to such election.

11. That the governors may vote by proxy; the proxy papers to be issued under the direction of the committee, and forwarded, post-paid, to all the governors, at least seven days before the day of election, except in cases where the same shall have been previously applied for and delivered.

12. That twelve governors shall have power to convene an extraordinary general meeting of the governors, by presenting a requisition for that purpose to the secretary, in writing (wherein the subject to be submitted shall be set forth): who shall thereupon call such meeting within fourteen days, and state the purpose for which it is called.

13. That, at all the general meetings of the governors, the proceedings of the last general meeting shall be read, and a quorum of five, exclusive of the honorary and medical officers, shall be competent to transact the business of the meeting; but no business shall be transacted unless five are actually present. Upon the motion of a governor, the chairman shall count the members, and if there are less than five, the meeting shall adjourn.

14. That the medical officers shall attend in all cases requiring consultation; and one of the surgeons shall be at the hospital daily, at one o'clock, for the relief of male applicants, and at five, for the relief of females and children.

15. That any destitute sick or diseased person shall be admitted as an out-door patient; and as many houseless or destitute sick or diseased person shall be, immediately on application, received into the wards of the hospital as its means will allow; no governor's order, nor any other preliminary form whatever, being requisite for admission.

16. That patients shall be furnished with medicines daily, from nine to eleven, one to three, and five to seven.

17. That no servant of the hospital shall take any fee or reward from any patient, or his or her friends, either directly or indirectly; and any one so offending shall be liable to be discharged by the committee.

18. That any person having cause of complaint against an officer or servant, shall state the same by letter or otherwise to the house visitors, or secretary, as the case may require; and if there be occasion, shall have notice to attend personally at the next meeting of the committee, to support such complaint.

19. That the committee shall have the power to appoint, suspend, or dismiss any paid officer or servant, except such as are elected by the governors at large. In case of misconduct on the part of any of the latter, the committee shall summon a general meeting of governors, to inquire into the circumstances, within fourteen days after the same has been brought before them.

20. That, at the monthly meeting of the committee, the minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read, put for confirmation, and, if confirmed, signed by the chairman; and then considered final. The collector's accounts shall be examined, and the reports of the house visitors and medical officers received, previous to the consideration of any new business.

21. That the committee shall examine the tradesmen's and other bills; and such of them as they may so direct shall be paid with drafts upon the treasurer. They shall further examine the receipts of the bills which were ordered to be paid at the previous meeting.

22. That the committee shall have power to form sub-committees for special purposes, whenever it may be deemed necessary.

23. That, at the meeting of the committee on the first Thursday in February, they shall appoint a sub-committee to prepare a report of the proceedings of the charity, and an account of the expenditure for the past year, which report and account, if approved by the committee, the account having been previously examined and signed by the auditors, shall be laid before the governors at the annual general meeting. The committee shall moreover submit to the governors at the annual meeting, the names of such persons as they shall deem desirable to form the committee for the ensuing year.

24. That no resolution shall be put to the meeting unless it be written, and have the names of the mover and seconder thereunto subscribed; and no resolution shall be entered upon the minutes unless it be first carried. All questions shall be determined by a majority of votes, the chairman being allowed a second or casting vote, whenever the numbers shall be equal.

HOUSE VISITORS OR HOUSE COMMITTEE.

25. That the members of the committee shall visit the hospital at their discretion; but at each monthly meeting three of their number shall be appointed house visitors, or house committee, for the ensuing month. They shall have the direction and responsibility of the internal management of the hospital. Any one or more of them shall be authorized to enter written orders in the order-book, for the purchase of all necessaries for the establishment; but orders for the surgical and medical departments must be previously signed by the senior and one other medical officer. The house visitors shall inspect and examine into such matters as shall be brought before them, and see that the affairs of the hospital are properly conducted. They shall enter their remarks from time to time in the house visitors' book, and such remarks shall be read at each monthly meeting. In the absence of the house visitors, the secretary may enter orders for articles immediately required, and do any other act which the house visitors may do.

26. That all the accounts of the hospital shall be regularly entered in books kept for that purpose, and afterwards posted in a ledger, under their several heads; which ledger shall be opened at all times to the members of the committee, and, at the annual and quarterly general meetings, to the governors of the charity.

VACANCIES.

27. That the committee may fill up any vacancy in their body.—See Rule 6.

28. That, upon a vacancy in any other elective office of the charity, the secretary shall immediately call a meeting of the committee, who shall direct notice to be given of such vacancy, and appoint a day to declare the same, agreeably to Rule 9.

29. That the testimonials of all applicants shall be laid before the committee, who shall select for the ballot such candidates as they shall consider properly and best qualified to fill the vacant office.

30. That no governor, whose subscription is in arrear, shall be entitled to vote until the same be paid.

ELECTIONS.

31. That the chair shall be taken at twelve at noon, when each candidate may depute a governor to be a scrutineer on his part. The secretary shall provide accurate lists of the governors, with the number of votes each is entitled to give, for the use of the chairman and scrutineers; and also a sufficient number of the candidates' names for the purpose of the ballot.

32. That every governor, on tendering his vote, shall deliver the paper containing the name of the candidate for whom he intends to vote, into the hands of the chairman, who shall deposit the same in the box or glass provided for that purpose.

33. That, if any dispute arise respecting the validity of a vote, the chairman's construction of the rules shall be decisive.

34. That, at the close of the ballot, the chairman shall announce the numbers, and declare that candidate to be duly elected who has the majority of votes.

35. That in all cases of an equality of votes, the chairman shall be entitled to a second or casting vote.

36. That, in every case where two or more balloting-papers may be folded together, they shall not be counted in the ballot.

37. That the doors shall be closed at three, when any governor in the room, who has not voted, shall be permitted to vote; but the doors shall not be re-opened for admission until after the state of the poll has been declared by the chairman.

38. That the minutes taken at every election shall be signed by the chairman, and, when signed, considered final.

ANNIVERSARY FESTIVAL.

39. That an anniversary festival, to celebrate the founding of this charity, shall be held as soon after the annual meeting as the committee can make the necessary arrangements, when all the governors shall be invited.

40. That, at this festival, the annual report of the committee, the state of the finances, and the number of the patients admitted during the preceding year, shall be read,

TREASURER.

41. That the treasurer shall receive all monies from the collector and others for the charity, and pay such accounts as the committee shall draw checks for; the same having been signed by the chairman, and one of their body, and countersigned by the secretary.

42. That he shall furnish his accounts to the committee when required so to do, stating the balance remaining in his hands; which balance shall be invested in the government securities, if, on the resolution of the committee, or of a general meeting of the governors, it shall be so directed.

43. That all legacies and donations above ten pounds shall be added to the invested sum; that the expenditure of each year shall not be more than the income arising from the annual subscriptions, the interest of the invested fund, and those donations which do not exceed ten pounds; and that no debts shall be incurred so as to anticipate the receipts of the charity.

HONORARY SECRETARY.

44. That the honorary secretary shall attend all meetings connected with the charity, take minutes of the proceedings, see the business arising therefrom promptly attended to, and entered upon the minutes.

45. That he shall conduct all the correspondence, under the direction of the governors in general meeting, or of the committee of management.

46. That he shall see that the business of the meetings, together with the reports and required returns, are previously made out and prepared.

47. That he shall immediately acknowledge the receipt of all contributions by a letter to the contributor, and direct that a printed receipt may accompany the same.

48. That he shall direct the collector in all matters of his office, and see that the business of the charity is regularly and strictly attended to.

TRUSTEES.

49. That three governors appointed for the purpose at a general meeting shall be trustees of the stock belonging to the charity, in whose names the same shall be invested; and no part thereof shall be sold out, except by a resolution of the governors at a general meeting. They shall make a report of the stock standing in their names as belonging to the charity at the annual general meeting.

PHYSICIAN.

50. That the physician of the hospital shall be a Fellow or Licentiate of the Royal College of Physicians in London.

SURGEONS.

51. That the surgeons of the hospital shall be members of the Royal College of Surgeons in London.

52. That the medical officers shall make a monthly report to the committee of the number of cases seen and attended at the hospital; and, by their own arrangement, provide for a regular attendance, agreeably to Rule 13.

53. That they shall constantly inspect the state of the drugs and other materials in the dispensary, and report thereupon at each monthly meeting of the committee.

RESIDENT DISPENSER.

54. That the dispenser shall be appointed by the medical officers, reside at the hospital, dispense the medicines as prescribed, and timely and properly deliver the same to the out-door, and administer them to the in-door patients.

55. That he shall take care of the utensils and medicines of the hospital, so that none of them are spoiled, wasted, or embezzled.

56. That he shall not be absent between the hours of nine in the morning and seven in the evening, without leave from the medical officers; and, in the event of an occasional absence, he shall provide a substitute, approved of by them.

57. That he shall keep a register of the patients in the manner directed by the medical officers.

58. That he shall not carry on any private business whatever, but shall receive such remuneration for his services as the committee may determine upon, provided only that his salary shall not exceed sixty guineas per annum, unless by consent of a general meeting of the governors.

COLLECTOR.

59. That the collector shall collect subscriptions as they become due, and use all diligence to promote the success of the charity and to increase its funds, by personally and otherwise soliciting contributions; that he shall enter at the office a correct list thereof, and pay the same to the treasurer when collected.

60. That he shall give such security for the faithful discharge of his duty as the committee may deem proper; and on no account retain in his hands any sum exceeding twenty pounds, for more than seven days.

61. That he shall lay his accounts before the committee at every monthly meeting, and be in attendance at the meetings of the charity when required to do so.

62. That he shall attend at the hospital at such times as may be deemed necessary, and conform to the directions of the committee and secretary.

HOSPITAL STEWARD.

63. That he shall be appointed by the committee of management, and execute the duties of his office under the direction and control of the house visitors, medical officers, and secretary.

MATRON.

64. That she shall be appointed by the committee, and be under the same direction and control as the house steward.

PATIENTS.

65. That the out-door patients shall furnish themselves, if required to do so, with gallipots and bottles to contain their medicine, and shall conform to the rules of the hospital, and to the directions of the officers.

DIET.

66. That proper diet for the patients shall be determined on by the house visitors and medical officers, and a specification of the same fixed up in the different wards of the hospital, for the satisfaction of the governors.

HISTORY

OF THE

ROYAL FREE HOSPITAL.

PREVIOUSLY to the founding of this Hospital, there was no Medical Establishment in this vast metropolis where the destitute stranger, when overtaken by sickness or disease, and disabled from moving about, could find an asylum for his immediate reception.

In the winter of 1827, a wretched female, under eighteen years of age, was seen lying on the steps of St. Andrew's Churchyard, Holborn-hill, after midnight, actually perishing through disease and famine. She was a total stranger in London, without a friend, and died two days afterwards, unrecognized by any human being. This distressing event, although by no means one of unfrequent occurrence at the period it happened, gave rise to the founding of an Hospital *entirely on the principle of free and instant admission*, in order to provide, if possible, for all cases of a similar nature; and the attention of Mr. William Marsden, Surgeon, being first drawn to the subject, he, in conjunction with Mr. Alderman Harmer (at whose residence the early meetings of the Institution were held), the late Alderman Winchester, Mr. John Watson, Mr. T. Hodginson, the late Mr. Barron, of Giltspur Street, Mr. Godfrey Goddard, and several other gentlemen in the neighbourhood, established a *Free Hospital*, under the denomination of "The London General Institution for the gratuitous cure of malignant diseases," which was opened to the public on the 28th day of February, 1828. Through the influence of Sir Robert Peel, the patronage of King George the Fourth was conceded to it, and the following year, the Duke of Gloucester became its President. By the exertions of the above-named gentlemen, the countenance and support of many noblemen and distinguished personages, of the Corporation of London, and other public bodies, were obtained; so that both its means and utility went on increasing, in a corresponding degree, till 1832, when that alarming and destructive scourge, Malignant Cholera,

appeared in London; and when, in order to carry out to the fullest extent the great principle of the charity, the Governors at once decided to throw open the doors of the Hospital to all persons afflicted with that dreadful malady, notwithstanding the other hospitals had *closed theirs* against them. Upwards of 700 Cholera patients were admitted, and the funds of the Charity in consequence depressed.

At the death of George the Fourth, his late Majesty King William honoured the Charity by becoming its Patron, and in 1835, caused its name to be changed to the FREE HOSPITAL. In the course of this year, their Royal Highnesses the Duchess of Kent and the Princess Victoria became Patronesses, and other ladies of high rank followed their good example. On the demise of the late Duke of Gloucester, one of the warmest friends the Hospital ever experienced, his Grace the Duke of Buccleuch and Queensberry was elected President; a nobleman, both affluent and generous, under whose kind auspices, it is ardently hoped, it may long continue to dispense relief and consolation to the most wretched of human beings, *the destitute sick*. At the lamented death of King William, the Hospital still retained the royal sanction; for our young and munificent Queen (through Lord John Russell) expressed her approbation of the Charity, and most graciously condescended to become its Patroness—PATRONESS OF THE AFFLICTED! Her Majesty further evinced her regard for the welfare of the Hospital by commanding that in future it should be called the ROYAL FREE HOSPITAL. Such distinguished patronage as this could not possibly fail to produce a beneficial effect, constituting, as it does, a sure indication and guarantee to the public of the usefulness and philanthropic character of the Charity.

During each year, great numbers of the destitute sick, on their own application, are received into the wards of this Hospital; and since its foundation in 1828, upwards of *one hundred thousand* patients have obtained relief by its means. Many wretched females have been restored to health, and not a few reclaimed, who, but for the timely aid afforded them by this Charity, must have closed a life of sin and misery by a premature death. There being no School of Medicine for Pupils at this Hospital, and therefore no exposure of female character, it is peculiarly suited for, and has been eminently successful in furthering this truly Christian work of Reformation.

THE
FOURTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF
THE COMMITTEE.

CIRCUMSTANCES at once most painful and wholly unparalleled, demand from your Committee a very different tone and a very different statement from those of former years. Hitherto it has been their pride and their pleasure to show how much disease and destitution were alleviated by your Charity—alas! instead of showing how much evil has been averted or remedied during the past year, they have now the solemn and appalling declaration to make, that the claimants for your succour have latterly so prodigiously increased, that the means your Hospital at present possesses are inadequate to meet the accumulating mass of poverty and wretchedness.

Despairing of accomplishing all that is necessary, your Committee do not however despair of accomplishing much. The greater the evil the greater has been, and will be, their efforts to stem it. Nevertheless, not daring to hope that the private benevolence which has hitherto sustained your Institution and enabled it to meet the pressing exigencies of former times, could enable it to meet the still more urgent

claims of the present, your Committee have determined upon laying before the Legislature a statement of the rapid and serious increase of disease and destitution, and the consequent necessity of so extending your sphere of usefulness as to make it commensurate with the necessities of the distressed sick.

This statement has been embodied in a petition to the House of Commons, which the Right Hon. Lord Robert Grosvenor has kindly undertaken to present, and which has already received the promised support of many of the oldest and most influential members of the Legislature.

In the midst of the difficulties which present themselves, and which seem to render your Charity comparatively inefficient, there is still every reason to believe from the many new and distinguished persons who have recently come forward to aid your great undertaking, that the most sanguine expectations of the warmest friends of the Charity will be fully realized.

As respects the financial statement of the year, although it will be seen that an increased expenditure has necessarily taken place, still it is gratifying to find that the Annual Subscriptions, as well as Donations (exclusive of Bequests), have considerably exceeded those at any former period; whilst the high esteem in which the principle of your Charity is held by the public is evidenced in the recent presentation of £250. by the Trustees of the Radcliffe Charity of the University of Oxford, as well as in a bequest of £500. under the will of the late Mr. Thomas, of East Street, Bloomsbury, which has been received, free of legacy duty, from his executors.

Much however as your Charity is indebted to the pecuniary assistance of both public bodies and private individuals, your Committee cannot but feel that such aid would have availed but little, had it not been accompanied with the indefatigable exertion and unwearied zeal of your Medical Officers. The duties of these gentlemen, always onerous, have occupied their attention during the past year, on the lowest average, more than four hours each day; and your Committee cannot but set forth, in the strongest terms, the punctuality and willingness with which these heavy duties have been and still are discharged, as meriting from the governors at large their especial notice and admiration.

In addition to this, your Committee deem it their duty to refer to the valuable assistance of the Rev. Hon. Secretary, who, besides the fulfilment of the ordinary duties of his office, has recently printed and distributed a Sermon preached by him in St. Paul's Cathedral, on a subject closely connected with the objects of your Charity, and calculated, by interesting the great mass of the public, to be of most material benefit.

Your Committee have also to congratulate the governors on the invaluable service which has been rendered to the Charity on all occasions by the public press. Not only does great benefit arise from the publication of the distressing cases which are constantly falling under the care of your medical officers, but the value of your Hospital is thereby becoming better known to the magistracy of the metropolis, and better appreciated by the poor themselves.

In conclusion, your Committee most strenuously urge upon all the governors and friends of the Charity the necessity of great and continued exertions, fully assured that the sound principle upon which it is founded requires only to be known in order to ensure for it the most unbounded support, and fully confident that ere long they shall have to congratulate the governors and the public on the erection of an Hospital of sufficient magnitude to relieve the necessities of the whole of the destitute diseased of this great metropolis.

A SERMON.

PSALM XLI. 1.

BLESSED IS HE WHO CONSIDERETH THE POOR ; THE LORD WILL DELIVER
HIM IN THE TIME OF TROUBLE.

It is greatly to be regretted—and no less a subject of astonishment than regret—that the social tendencies of the gospel, though one of its most obvious and important evidences, are often inadequately appreciated and sometimes altogether overlooked. Of those who endeavour to achieve from the singularity of their opinions a distinction that is not attainable by their talents;—and who deny what others affirm, and affirm what others deny, because at this easy rate is purchased the reputation of a philosopher or a wit;—the far greater part delude themselves and deceive others by separating what God has joined: by regarding christian doctrine apart from christian duty, and contemplating the principles of the gospel as being merely speculative or doctrinal, irrespective of the practice to which they necessarily lead. On this partial view we are told by some, who arrogate to themselves the title of

“Rational Christians;” that is, in other words, who measure by the span of reason the wide, yea rather the boundless expanse of revelation;—that they cannot comprehend that “great mystery of godliness,” how the Godhead should become man; how the Lord of glory should suffer and agonize; how the Prince of Life could die. They cannot comprehend it, and therefore they will not credit it. But would these specious but most unsound arguers tell us, in the aspect of things around them, in the constitution of man and in the administration of the universe, how much they are forced to credit which they cannot comprehend? The text, simple and intelligible as it seems, and as, when practically applied, it is, involves in its theory two mysteries which neither can the philosopher unravel, nor the preacher explain; and yet at the same time affirms two facts which neither the preacher nor the philosopher can deny. Why should there be any “time of trouble?” and why should there be any class of “poor?” Why should not He who looked upon all that He had made, and “behold it was very good,” have precluded the entrance of evil, whether physical or moral, into His perfectly harmonious work? Why should not He “from whom all good things do come,” and who cannot be impoverished, however abundantly He may impart;—why should not He have conferred with an impartial and undistinguishing

liberality on all His children (for “we all have one Father; one God hath created us”), those things which He knows to be “needful to the body,” as being conducive to the enjoyment, and sometimes even essential to the maintenance and support, of life? The facts, I presume, of poverty in many, and of liability to trouble in all, are undeniable;—and if any one think that the most philosophical method of solving one difficulty is to invent a greater, he may suppose that blind chance has ordained some to be poor, and others to be rich; and that necessity, alike irresistible and unaccountable, has allotted to all who are born of woman some portion of the cup of bitterness and some of the sparks of trouble. But here at least we take things as they are; we do not attempt to escape from the fact, because we cannot explain the mystery. We find it far more easy to credit God with doing right in things wherein we cannot comprehend His purpose, than to arraign Infinity at the bar of that atom of intelligence which animates our tabernacle of dust. We do not call on the Almighty to explain why He has appointed “trouble,” and why He has ordained “the poor;” wherefore there is so much evil, when there might have been only good, and so many who are destitute, when a more equal distribution would have ensured a sufficiency for all? We do not arrogantly tell God

that we will not acknowledge His wisdom, merely because we cannot comprehend His way. We thankfully avail ourselves of the information imparted to us in His word as to all that concerns ourselves; and we are grateful even for the tremulous lustre of the star that illumines the darkness of our pilgrimage on earth, expecting that beyond the grave the full light of the Divinity will be our eternal habitation, and that "we shall know even as we are known." Meantime whatever there may be of mystery in God's purpose in permitting poverty, there is no uncertainty whatever either as to the precept of Christ, or as to the promise of God, respecting the right employment of wealth. "Make to yourselves friends of the mammon of unrighteousness, for when ye fail they shall receive you into everlasting habitations." "Blessed is he who considereth the poor: the Lord will deliver him in the time of trouble."

We have in these words,

- I. On the part of some, a NECESSITY.
- II. On the part of others, a DUTY.
- III. (And this is common to all) a PROMISE.

May the Holy Spirit of God open our understandings to understand the scriptures, and may the understanding of our duty lead to the practice of it, through Jesus Christ!

We have, first, *on the part of some* a NECESSITY; in other words, we have the poor, and we always shall have them; for, said Moses, "the poor will never cease out of the land;" and our own Master glanced His prophetic view even to the end of time when He said, "The poor ye have always with you, but me ye have not always." Now poverty is always, and under all circumstances, socially considered, an evil. In commercial cities like our own, it is an evil of peculiar magnitude. Among us it is generally stigmatized as a reproach, often shunned as a pestilence, and occasionally punished as a crime. How greatly then must the evil of poverty be embittered by circumstances which render comparatively or altogether valueless the advantages even of wealth—circumstances of trouble and trial, of sickness and suffering; prostration of strength, decay of reasoning powers, and total aberration of mind! It is an evil, a great evil, to be penniless;—what then is it to be friendless? And since these generally go together, what is it to be houseless, helpless, hopeless? Those of this congregation who are enriched with the superfluities; those who are provided with the comforts; those even who are supplied with the necessaries of life, cannot form an adequate conception. But in order to convey such an idea as can be conveyed, without personal experience, of the amount

of trouble which may concentrate its horrors on the head of some one suffering fellow-creature, I will delineate from the records of the Institution, whose cause I am here to advocate, a brief outline of two cases which have occurred within the last few weeks; cases deserving credit, and both of the weaker sex. I purposely give the initials only, but the facts can be verified at the Hospital by any who may take the trouble of making personal inquiries there.

“*M. A. W.*,* (a person so designated,) had no home, and was obliged to abide sick in the streets three nights: she went to an asylum, but was told not to come again, as she was too ill to be admitted.” Now this was extreme, but still individual suffering. Let us take another case.

“*S. S.* was sent away from an asylum at eleven o’clock at night, having a sick child only ten weeks old, and being utterly destitute.”

What would have become of the sick woman in the one case, and the sick child in the other, if

there had not been at least one Institution in this metropolis which would open its doors to the perishing outcast without those formalities and requirements—needful, we will admit, wherever practicable—which are usually demanded in our Hospitals of more ancient date; but formalities of which the poor are too often ignorant, and requirements with which the destitute are rarely able to comply? The very possibility of such cases as I have sketched, would alone create a necessity; but if the contingency would, how much more the certainty, how much more the frequency? To what then does the necessity amount? Obviously to this. That the poor (or as you will find the word more accurately rendered in the margin of your Bibles, “the weak or sick”) should be “*considered*,” that provision should be made expressly for their need;—that the precept of Christ respecting them should be fulfilled, and the practice of Christ towards them should be imitated, by all who bear the christian name, recognise the christian rule of action, and desire or anticipate the christian reward. We are told in the 68th Psalm, that “God hath of His goodness provided for the poor;” and so he has; for he has enjoined a rule of life and enforced a principle of action on all who fear His name, which, if duly carried out, would leave no poor unprovided for; which at least would

make the moment of necessity contemporaneous with the instant of relief. But then we continually see the selfishness and the covetousness of man counterworking the benevolent ordinances of God. Men will not be God's instruments in doing good; though never will much good be done in any other character or from any other motive. They may talk of philanthropy, and patriotism, and policy; but philanthropy without religion evaporates in talk; and patriotism without religion is much more ready to exaggerate wrongs than to redress them; and policy without religion draws the line of support just above the point of starvation; and of no society comprehending many thousands (with one single exception at least), have we ever read that "neither was there among them any that lacked." That single exception, I need not say, was the Church of Christ, in the days of its primitive, and alas! its evanescent purity; for soon the waters that had been parted as by a miracle returned to their accustomed channel; soon, too soon, were inequalities of circumstances and condition once more witnessed among the brotherhood of Christ;—soon it became necessary to charge the rich in this world, that "they should be glad to distribute and willing to communicate;"—and that necessity still continues, for "the poor shall never cease out of the land." One thing, however, is cer-

tain, that in proportion as the Church (I mean the Church built on Christ Jesus as its foundation) in any nation, city, or locality, approximates to the model of those of whom the world was not worthy; those on whom rested the orient beams of the Sun of Righteousness ere yet the clouds of worldly principle and practice had gathered within the pure atmosphere of the Church; so will there be a more abundant provision for the necessities of the poor, the weak, and the sick; and it will be seen that God, in bestowing upon mankind the gospel of grace and truth through Christ Jesus, bestows on them, if it were duly applied, a sufficient and sovereign remedy for all social, and for many physical evils. And is this saying too much? Is it the language of exaggeration and hyperbole? No, brethren; it is the language of observation and experience. I myself have ministered in this vast metropolis, this modern Babylon, during the space of half a generation, and I have witnessed manifold cases of destitution, multiplied scenes of varied and complicated wretchedness; but I cannot recollect one that might not have been alleviated, and I *can* recollect many that might have been averted, had the principle of God's word been kept in view by those who endured, and by those who occasioned, and by those who could have relieved the suffering. "Look not

every man on his own things, but every man also on the things of others:"—there is true philanthropy—there is real patriotism—there is the only sound policy; the policy of religion! Did we indeed live for others so far as we ought;—and so far as we might do, without ceasing to live for ourselves, and for those who are most near and dear to us;—how would the fearful aggregate of human misery be diminished, how much of the bitterness would be drained from the cup of sorrow, how many of the sparks of trouble extinguished in their first ascent! But there is a NECESSITY for the poor;—a necessity for themselves, that, like Lazarus, they may be disciplined for the bosom of Abraham; a necessity for us, that like St. Paul we, in doing good to them, may be followers of our Lord and Master. Their NECESSITY generates our DUTY; and with this observation I shall proceed to examine,

II. *The DUTY of those who are NOT poor to consider those that are.*

It will not be denied that the poor have a claim to our regard on the ground of their natural consanguinity. The language of Scripture cannot be rejected even by the infidel, when it declares that "God hath made of one blood all nations which

dwell upon the earth," unless it can be proved (which is impossible), that the accident of birth exercises any influence over the powers of the mind; or that the variation of complexion or of climate causes any difference in man's capacity to suffer, or in man's liability to disease. But of mere human sympathy, which is otherwise called philanthropy, we may remark without disparagement, that it is much more prone to blaze than to burn; it kindles spontaneously on the manifestation of any peculiar emergence or necessity, and sends up a broad and bright flame which for a few moments absorbs and eclipses every other light, but ordinarily it subsides as rapidly as it ascended, and leaves light and warmth to be afforded by the steady fires which glow though they do not glare, and which are fed with constant fuel, and watched with ceaseless vigilance. To speak without a figure,—if an earthquake were to overwhelm some populous city, or if an inundation were to sweep away some devoted village, or if the wild outbreak of revolutionary phrensy were again to do as it *has* done, expatriate a persecuted priesthood and a proscribed nobility; or if the wreck of the stranded vessel, or the ravages of the devouring flame, were to make at one fierce blow many widows and orphans; or if a failure in the produce of the earth were to threaten sterility and starvation to

thousands of our fellow-beings, then it might be seen that there is human sympathy even in the great mass of mankind, however indifferent they may be to religious motives and impulses, however practically regardless even of nominal Christianity. But when we descend to common-place wretchedness, when we come to familiar destitution, to the disease of a single sufferer, or the contagion of a single dwelling; when we come to grapple with the unintermitted, and too often unregarded necessities of those who depend in time of health on their own labour, but in the hour of sickness on the supply of public or private benevolence; the need is THEN discerned of something more durable than the impulse of sympathy—more patient and more practical than feeling—in other words, of what is termed in the text, *consideration*. Now this, we do not hesitate to affirm, can be grounded only on principle; and principle, if it is not to give way where it should be strongest, and to fluctuate where it should be steadiest, must exist in the acknowledgment of an inviolable authority, and operate by the imitation of an unalterable pattern; in other words, it must be obedience to the law of God, or which is the same thing, conformity to the example of Christ. In the words of our divine Master, “the poor ye have always with you,” there is implied to every one of His disciples

a perpetual necessity, and consequently a perpetual obligation, in respect of the poor. What we cannot do personally to our Master, we are to do to those whom He has honoured by making them His representatives: and for whom it will be found that He has thus provided also whenever the Church “shall arise and shine, for her light is come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon her;” whenever Christianity in name and in word shall be exchanged throughout the millions of her members for Christianity in deed and in truth.

While, however, the duty is universal, the responsibility is individual. “If I am a subject of Christ’s kingdom (every man should argue,) I must be obedient to Christ’s law; if I am concerned to attain God’s promises, I must be ready to fulfil God’s precepts.” Consideration belongs to each, though obligation extends to all. What then is consideration? It is first to ascertain, by inspection or inquiry, the actual condition of the poor; it is then to make the supply suited to, and as far as possible commensurate with the demand. And though in illustrating this I shall take an individual case, it is one upon which you may easily generalize, and one upon which, most certainly, you may effectually and immediately act.

We have in this great city, which may be termed the metropolis of charity as well as of Christianity, Asylums for every kind of wretchedness, Hospitals and Infirmaries for every variation of disease; but until the Institution which I am here to advocate was established, we had not what perhaps we most wanted;—we had not an Hospital whose range of mercy was unlimited,—an Asylum whose doors of refuge were never closed. In places of shelter for the houseless, where the healthy are congregated, there are sufficient reasons for excluding the sick (and these reasons apply to the cases which I have already stated,) for there is the risk of communicating infection, and consequently of multiplying distress. And again, in our ancient and royal or noble hospitals, wherein the sick poor are admitted, and attended with a care and skill often unattainable by those of larger means and of higher rank,—local claims, sudden casualties, and the recommendation of those benefactors who supply a portion of the funds, obtain, and are entitled to a preference; nor have we any disposition to object to this, provided there also be, as now there is, though on a scale very far from being proportionate to the public necessities, a *Free Hospital, into which those may be admitted who have no recommendation, no friend, no means of providing absolute necessaries, no claim on legislative provision, no plea but the manifest urgency*

of the case. This also I will illustrate by examples; I will force it on your sympathies by the resistless eloquence of facts.

“*W. S.* applied at the Hospital of St. Bartholomew, having a Governor’s letter, but could not be received. He was taken thence to the Lord Mayor, who directed him to be sent to the Royal Free Hospital. This man had been ill three months, and was so exhausted when he arrived as to be unable to speak.”

Were, then, these three months of exhaustion a claim of inferior urgency to a fractured limb? Was not the peril of life equal? Must not the amount of suffering have been incomparably greater? We do not in saying this imply the remotest disparagement to that noble institution, which, since the days of its royal founder, the first Protestant king—taking its annual average of patients, has probably afforded relief and refuge to a greater number of sufferers than the existing population of the whole metropolis. Another and a similar case shall now be stated, by which it will appear that there is a limit to the ability even of these princely charities.

“*I. S.* was at the Houseless Poor Asylum two nights, but on the third was found too ill to be again received. He was taken by a compassionate

gentleman* in a coach to the London Hospital, but could not be admitted. He was afterwards brought by the same gentleman and set down in Greville-street, and told to apply himself at the Institution. Being in a destitute condition and dangerously ill, from having taken cold through being compelled to sell his clothes to obtain food, he was admitted into this Hospital without a Governor's letter, without a change of linen, without even the application of the philanthropic individual who brought him thither." Why? The conductors of this Institution beheld him ready to perish, and his necessity was recognised at once as a claim upon their aid.

Thus, not to detain you too long on individual cases, upwards of 60,000 sick and suffering fellow-creatures have been relieved by means of this charity since its commencement in the year 1828—an average of more than 6,000 annually; and within the last year no less than 8,298. So that should it continue to be a blessing to the metropolis for a period equal to that during which the great Royal Hospital of St. Bartholomew has been so, it will, even with its present confined and most inadequate means, have extended its seasonable and generous relief to a million and a half of suffering fellow-creatures; all

children of the same Father, brethren of the same family, exposed to the same sufferings, inheritors of the same immortality!

Consider now, therefore, the condition of the poor as already ascertained to be *this*;—that in the courts, and lanes, and alleys of this great metropolis are found in one year more than 8,000 of our fellow-citizens (and many of them our brother Christians) suffering under the combined pressure of destitution and disease; that many of these have no claim on the legislative provision, except the right, if we may call it so, of being passed through a hundred parishes to find a resting-place in none; nor yet any means of procuring admission into those hospital palaces where science manifests her kindred with humanity by administering to the necessities of the poor with as much skill and tenderness as if they were the noble and the wealthy of the land. It requires but little consideration accordingly to discern the absolute necessity of an *Institution on the principle of the Royal Free Hospital, a special supply adapted to a special demand*; and the only source of astonishment must be that its funds are still so far from meeting the exigencies of the case. But surely this would cease to be, if those who are called Christians; nay, brethren, if those only who *are* Churchmen, would consider the obligation imposed on them by the text. Surely,

the evil would be mitigated, and mitigated in some slight degree even within a few short moments, if each of you here present before God would take into account his own personal interest in the promise that is connected with the precept, "Blessed is he who considereth the poor; the Lord will deliver him in the time of trouble."

III. In this concluding portion of our subject, brethren, *the promise as connected with the performance of the duty*, one thing is certain—that a time *will* come, even if it has not already arrived, in which each of ourselves will need deliverance. "Man is born to trouble;" and whatever be his foresight, and whatever be his policy, he can neither change nor modify the charter and condition of his existence. Whether from friends alienated or estranged from altered circumstances or declining health; whether from the pressure of disappointment, the gradual development of mortal disease within him, or the apprehension, and, at last, the approach of death; sooner or later the stoutest heart must tremble, and the strongest frame must fail. "Man that is born of a woman is of few days, and full of trouble;" "and life," to which we trust, "is but itself a vapour, that appeareth for a little while and then vanisheth away." True wisdom, therefore, would dictate the preparation of the remedy, the provision of the blessing, if not before

the crisis and conflict is drawing nigh (for it may be even now, though we see it not, close at hand), at least before its actual presence shall paralyze all the powers of the body, and wither all the energies of the mind. "To every thing," said the wise man, "there is a season, and a time to every purpose under heaven; a time to sow the seed, and a time to reap the harvest;" and what is it but folly, madness, infatuation, to defer the sowing of the seed until the hour when the Angel, the Reaper commissioned by the Lord of the harvest, "putteth in the sickle because the harvest is come?" One act of *consideration*,—of deliberate and dutiful consideration for the poor—prompted by a sense of christian brotherhood, and conformed to the standard of christian love—far outweighs the constrained and tardy acknowledgment which is wrung forth by the anticipation of a speedy reckoning, and the slow and reluctant conviction of the worthlessness of wealth. To the giver, if not to the receiver, a comparatively small contribution rightly bestowed, is better, far better than even an ample legacy; because in the time of trouble, the one is the memorial of what he *has* done, the other is only the recognition of what he *ought* to have done; and though during the period of health, and while presuming on the continuance of life, our estimate of the value of money is, and will one day be proved to be fictitious, yet the error is so far beneficial, that it

affords us more conclusive evidence of our sincerity in what we do at once. It is easier to bequeath hundreds than it is to bestow tens or even single pounds. In death we are almost as ready to give what we cannot keep back, as we are disposed in life to keep back what we ought to give. But I know of no more powerful stimulus to benevolence, and, certainly, of no higher authority for the practice of it, than that which is set before us in the text. 'The necessities of the destitute have (it has surely been proved!) a strong claim on our humanity; the precepts of our God should have a still stronger claim on our duty; and the promises of our Redeemer weigh not less strongly upon our interest. If in the great day of retribution, when the eternal destinies will be fixed, and all who have possessed what *we* possess, the talent of intelligent existence, whether it may have been perverted or improved, shall render an account thereof;—if there are some to whom the Judge will then say, "I was hungry and ye gave me meat, I was thirsty and ye gave me drink, I was a stranger and ye took me in, I was naked and ye clothed me, I was sick and ye visited me;"—if such shall be indeed the words of Him who will preside over the proceedings of that tremendous day, unto whom every one of ourselves must answer for his own occupancy, then I leave you, my brethren, *to determine what interest you have in supporting an Institution which does*

all these; which gives food to the hungry, drink to the thirsty, takes in the sick and perishing stranger, clothes the naked, and gives medicine to heal their sickness. I call upon you to determine what interest you have, each of you, in supporting an Institution which not only does all these, but does them *on a principle more closely allied than that of any similar establishment to the universal benevolence of Him* "who maketh his sun to rise on the evil and on the good, and sendeth rain on the just and on the unjust." As the funds of this Institution are freely received, so are they freely dispensed, and dispensed with no other consideration than the necessity of the perishing suppliant. And thus it ought to be; "For if ye do good to them which do good to you, what thank have ye? for sinners also do even the same. And if ye lend to them of whom ye hope to receive, what thank have ye? for sinners also lend to sinners, to receive as much again. But love ye your enemies, and do good, and lend, hoping for nothing again, and your reward shall be great, and ye shall be the children of the Highest: for he is kind to the unthankful and to the evil. Be ye therefore merciful, as your Father also is merciful."

Finally, with the sense of the obligation and with the performance of the duty, combine the expectation of the reward: "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy." Is there any one present

who does *not* stand in need of mercy and forgiveness before God? If then you would seek mercy, show it; if you would obtain, impart it. *Now* is the time of "consideration," and the time of "trouble" may not be far off. *Now* is the season for sowing, but the harvest may be close at hand. O let us then each depart with a solemn and awakening inquiry (it is one which conscience ought to propose, and to which it will assuredly return a true reply), "If the sickle were to be put in to-night," what seed should I have sown to-day? If on returning to my home I were to meet the messenger of death, what portion should I have in the blessing of Him "who considereth the poor and needy," and whom the Lord hath engaged to "deliver in his time of trouble?" Ah, brethren, what is given is not lost: it is only laid up against that day in which all that you now possess, and all that you leave behind, will avail you nothing. "He that hath pity upon the poor lendeth unto the Lord; and that which he layeth out shall be paid to him again." If that is a promise to be trusted, there is also a duty to be performed: go ye, therefore, and discharge it, and doubt not ye shall be blessed in the deed.—*Amen.*
